COMMODORE'S MESSAGE

CLUB NEWS

As we close in on the end of the current term, I thought it a good time to report on some of the progress made on the LMYC Board's Strategic Plan.

- The Club has traded well over the last two years, with trading records broken a few times. This is particularly pleasing with the current cost of living difficulties effecting all our members.
- The establishment of our Discover Sailing Centre including the purchase of two training yachts and the employment of a Sailing Manager to oversee and drive the process to attract new members.
- Closer cooperation with other Sailing Clubs has continued with not only divisional interclub racing but also using our training yachts to further strengthen club ties.
- Completed Phase 1 of the rectification of the Marina wave fence has resulted in the Marina now full, with a waiting list of yachts wishing to get a berth.
- Completed the replacement of the kitchen floor including refurbished the kitchen.

- The new mast crane was installed and has been very well used. The significant discount for Members has seen several new members join the club, as well as riggers from outside of the Lake using our facility. One rigger spoke about bringing boats down from Coffs Habour for re-rigging.
- We have successfully lobbied for a permanent solution to dredging Swansea channel with all three levels of government having made commitments to a permanent solution. At this point calls for tender have been made for the supply of a dredge and sand transfer pipeline to Blacksmiths Beach.
- Our Waterfront Marquee has served us well but has its drawbacks in severe weather. In order to maintain our assets and secure our facilities, we have ordered a new Marquee, which will be more weatherproof as well as air-conditioned. We expect to have the new Marquee installed prior to September.

Over the next few weeks, the Board will be developing the Strategic Plan for the next two years

February is the end of the membership year with renewal of membership now due. At the last Board Meeting, membership fees were discussed. The board resolved that due to the current financial difficulties that many are feeling and the strong trading of the Club, the membership fees would not be increased this year.

REGATTA REPORT

ADAMS 10 AUSTRALIAN CHAMPIONSHIP 2025

The 2025 Adams 10 Australian Championships was sailed at Middle Harbour Yacht Club (MHYC) on 14-16 February 2025. Two local boats travelled to MHYC representing Lake Macquarie Yacht Club (LMYC), being Belinda Braidwood & her crew onboard '*Backchat'* & David Young & his crew onboard '*Tenacity*'.

Ten competitors competed in the 9 race Series held over the 3 days which saw varying conditions from flukey rainy weather to exhilarating 25+ knot winds. With the combination of ferry traffic, other harbour racing fleets, gusty winds, and a big southern swell allowed at least one boat to hit 16 knots on the speedo downwind! The high-speed jostling made for some real exciting and very close racing.

After a massive effort, team Braidwood took the Podium, winning the Adams 10 Nationals for 2025. This was the first time Belinda took to helming '*Backchat*' and she certainly led her team and upheld '*Backchat*'s' reputation in winning their 6th Nationals Championships (2018, 2020, 2022, 2023, 2024 & 2025).

Congratulations must also go to Tracey Richardson & her team on 'Artemis' from MHYC in placing second overall and to the other seven boats who also had ladies onboard crewing. It is great to see that our sport of Sailing is having more ladies involved and female skippers dominating the Podium with 1st & 2nd place finishes!

HISTORY LOCKER 'RANI' – The Little Boat That Could!

Lake Macquarie Yacht 'Rani' Wins First Sydney to Hobart Race

In 1945 after the war, a group of sailors from the Cruising Yacht Club discussed having a cruise to Hobart from Sydney. Capt. John Illingworth, the British Fleet Engineer Officer, stationed at Garden island and a noteworthy yachtsman, persuaded them to make it into a race. And so, on Boxing Day, 9 yachts set out to traverse the 630 nautical miles in what was to become the inaugural Sydney – Hobart Yacht race, an icon of Australian sport. One of the smallest yachts was the *"Rani"*, a double ended 35 foot cutter built by Les Steel at Speers Point. Capt. Illingworth enlisted a crew of Royal Navy officers, engineers and local amateur yachtsmen to fine tune, scrub and paint. *"Rani"* was made from Huon pine planking, copper nailed to the frame. The sails were made from hand stitched cotton; ropes – Indian hemp; mast of Oregon pine.



Most of the boats were heavy cruising yachts with deep keels. In the line-up was the 52 foot "Winston Churchill", patriotically named, and considered to be the foremost yacht in Australia; its hull was polished with floor wax so it would glide faster through the water.

Radios were not compulsory back then. "Rani" had loaned one, but 2 valves burnt out before they set out; so, they departed with no viable means of communication.

Safety controls were almost non-existent – no life rafts, rescue ships; no helicopters to rescue or guide. They sailed with only traditional navigational aids – paper charts, compasses for steering, sextants for position.

As often happens, the weather turned on the second day of the race and they had to battle against gale force southerly winds (force 9) and wild seas with waves up to 50 feet high in the Tasman Sea and across Bass Straight. The storm lasted for 36 hours and all the yachts hove to or sheltered, except for "Rani".

The men were exhausted as they worked hard to keep control of "Rani" as they headed vertically down waves, then popped back up. The main sail ripped, but was repaired by one of the crew.

Water below decks floated the labels off bottles and tins, which consequently choked the bilge pump; and left no clues as to the contents of the food containers, making meals a total surprise – baked beans or custard?


Memories of crewman Ray Richmond

Race officials and the RAAF were unable to make contact or locate them in their searches. "Rani" had disappeared from sight and contact; even the RAAF Catalinas despatched to track boats were unable to sight "Rani". It was presumed she was lost, and that in hindsight it was a mistake to let such a relatively small yacht join the race. The storm was followed by a calm, and the "Rani" crew despaired that they would be last as they seemed to be moving ever so slowly.

A RAAF Catalina eventually spotted them in Storm Bay at the mouth of the Derwent River. As they moved up the Derwent and came closer, messages began to be flashed in Morse Code using car headlights, to ascertain that it was *"Rani"* and she was safe.

Illingworth wanted to know how many boats were in; astounded by the answer that they were the first. They crossed the line and berthed at Sullivan's Cove to a hero's welcome at Constitution Dock, where they opened the bottle of whisky handed to them to celebrate their historic win.

"Rani" took both line and handicap honours in 6 days, 4 hours and 22 minutes; arriving on 1st January, 1946. (The record now is 1 day, 9 hours, 15 minutes and 24 seconds – *"Comanche"* in 2017).
